



Crime in the City of Port Jervis

The City of Port Jervis experienced its lowest recorded PART I Overall Crime reduction since 1980.



The Port Jervis City Police Department continues to successfully maintain lower crime rates, traffic crashes, overdose deaths and fear of crime through the deployment of a proactive, community-based strategy that incorporates the Pillars of 21st Century Police emphasizing:

- Engaging in community policing as the cornerstone of building trust, legitimacy and reducing crime
- Developing effective policy and oversight
- Utilization of technology and social media
- Staff development and training, education, prevention and community outreach
- Enhancing officer safety and wellness
- Prioritizing safe, responsive, consistent staffing levels and deployments

PILLARS OF 21ST CENTURY POLICING



Part I & Part II Reported Crimes

Part I UCR index incidents are reported in two categories: violent and property crimes. Aggravated assault, forcible rape, murder and robbery are classified as violent offenses while arson, burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft are classified as property crimes. Part 1 crimes are collectively known as Index crimes as these crimes are considered quite serious in nature, tend to be reported more reliably than others and are reported directly to the police.

Part II Offense categories represent a multitude of less serious offenses and are tracked as follows: simple assault, quality of life offenses, forgery and counterfeiting, disorderly conduct, driving under the influence, drug offenses, fraud, gambling, liquor offenses, offenses against the family, prostitution, sex offenses, stolen property, criminal mischief, weapons offenses and all other offense classifications. Many factors may contribute to fluctuating levels of Part I and II offenses. These factors include weather, economic conditions, unemployment rates, alcohol and drug abuse, proactive community policing and enforcement initiatives, new technologies, proactive investigative and patrol presence and increased citizen crime prevention efforts.

A deficient aspect of the UCR is a statistical accounting measure known as "The Hierarchy Rule". When more than one offense occurs within an incident, only the most serious crime contributes to the agency's monthly crime totals. For instance, if a case involved a burglary, assault and theft, our agency would count only the highest offense committed, burglary, of the multiple offenses occurring in this single incident for the monthly totals because burglary is the highest offense on the hierarchy. For reporting purposes, the highest single offense committed is reported even when multiple offenses are committed. The Hierarchy Rule does not provide a true accounting of offenses and the department will be investigating the feasibility of transferring to the FBI's National Incident Based Reporting System in the future.



Part II Offenses

In Part II, the following categories are tracked: simple assault, drug sales and possession, quality of life offenses, loitering, embezzlement, forgery and counterfeiting, reckless endangerment, endangering the welfare of a child, disorderly conduct, driving under the influence, frauds, gambling, liquor offenses, offenses against the family, prostitution, sex offenses, stolen property, vandalism and weapons offenses. Part II Offenses have decreased by 19% from 2017. Most crime categories experienced minor to significant decreases except crimes involving driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs which increased by 45.6% due to increased enforcement efforts.

Arrest and Offense Data

The Port Jervis City Police Department investigated a total of 1,819 cases involving felonies, misdemeanors and violations. Twenty-five court ordered search warrants were obtained for narcotics investigations and for evidence related to major criminal activity, increased seizures of heroin, US currency and motor vehicles used to traffic illicit controlled substances. In addition, a total of 1,383 criminal arrests of offenders above the age of 18 were filed in the department representing a 7.5% decrease from 2018. 2019 reportable arrests are summarized in the tables below according to population demographics and specified age ranges:




Calls for Service

Calls for service include activities reported by residents or the police ranging from minor noise complaints, disturbances, crimes in progress and traffic crashes. In 2019, City Police Officers investigated 12,257 calls for service representing a 4.4% decrease from 2018. Blotter types to include disturbances, harassments, domestic disturbances, larceny, community policing, medical aided, suspicious persons, noise complaints, drug investigations, peace keeping and well-being checks account for a significant portion of calls, with the majority of calls being initiated by telephone calls to our seven-digit emergency line, E-911, walk-in traffic and officer initiated in the field. 
Domestic Violence Intervention - DART Program

Combatting domestic violence and empowering domestic violence survivors requires collaboration. The Port Jervis City Police Department, through enhanced training and collaboration with Fearless of the Hudson Valley, formerly known as Safe Homes of Orange County, Orange County Probation Department and the Orange County District Attorney's Office, continue our partnership in a highly successful Domestic Abuse Response Team 'DART' Intervention Program that started in 2017.


This program provides a model multi-disciplinary response to address intimate partner violence in our community and provide increased risk and safety assessments, reporting, access to victim services and incident follow-up to reduce the incidents of intimate partner violence and death. In 2019, our part time co-located Fearless Domestic Violence Project Coordinator was increased to full time coverage with the Port Jervis Police Department to provide enhanced training, resources, obtain timely data regarding incidents of domestic violence, case follow-up and field safety visits. In 2019, the team responded to 423 reported domestic incident related calls for service representing a 6% decrease from 2018. Of these investigations, it was determined that 139 incidents resulted in the commission of a criminal offense representing a 30% decrease from 2018 and a 42% decrease from 2017. Simple assault and violations of Orders of Protections continue to represent the majority of offenses encountered by officers investigating these complex crimes. Since 1995, six homicides were attributed to domestic/intimate partner related violence.

Traffic Safety

A vital mission priority is to provide continuous efforts to improve traffic safety and facilitate the safe movement of vehicles, bicycles and pedestrians throughout the city. These are the primary goals of the traffic enforcement initiatives conducted by members of the patrol division. In addition to the highly visible uniformed patrol officers deployed throughout the city, patrol officers participate in a variety of county and state initiatives targeting accident causing behaviors, impaired driving and improving pedestrian safety.

During 2019, the Port Jervis Police Department utilized grant funding to participate in traffic safety programs in an effort to reduce aggressive and distracted driving and target those individuals who operate a motor vehicle while under the influence of drugs or alcohol. Speeding, operating a motor vehicle while using a cellular telephone, failure to yield the right of way to pedestrians in crosswalks, driving while intoxicated and other aggressive driving behaviors have been the core focus of departmental enforcement and educational efforts to reduce accidents in our community.


Prevention and educational activities are an important role of our traffic safety program. Officers provide information at events, appear at speaking and demonstration engagements throughout the year and teach both pedestrian and bicycle safety to our children through various programs in cooperation with our schools and neighborhood watch groups.

Motor Vehicle Accidents

In 2019, accidents involving property damage increased by 8.8% and auto accidents involving personal injury were reduced by 8% as compared with 2018. In addition, increased enforcement efforts to detect drivers who operate a motor vehicle while impaired by alcohol or drugs have resulted in the increased apprehension of impaired drivers by over 27% since 2018. The graph below represents a historical comparison of crashes involving property damage, personal injury, pedestrian injury and fatalities occurring in the City of Port Jervis from 2012 through 2019:

Hope Not Handcuffs

In October 2019, the City of Port Jervis Police Department and Operation P.J. Pride community substance abuse prevention coalition began participation in the "Hope Not Handcuffs" program. Hope Not Handcuffs-Hudson Valley, a program of the Tri-County Community Partnership Inc., is aimed at bringing law enforcement, community organizations and volunteers together to find viable treatment options for individuals seeking help to reduce dependency with any substance including heroin, prescription drugs and alcohol. Hope Not Handcuffs will provide the "Angels", specially trained volunteers who will assist and facilitate treatment options and provide an "Angel Bin" containing essential personal care items such as clothing, that will be secured at our station.

Anyone seeking help in the fight of drug or alcohol addiction may come to the Port Jervis Police Department and ask for the Hope Not Handcuffs program. They will be treated with compassion and respect while an officer connects the individual with an "Angel" who will actively seek out a treatment plan. Individuals suffering from addiction will instantly gain an advocate and a network of resources designed to lead them to success. Hope Not Handcuffs is a proactive approach to reach out to people struggling with drug addiction to encourage them to seek recovery and regain control of their lives. Since its inception, HNH founded in Michigan has expanded to include over 80 police departments in 9 counties and has successfully connected more than 3,300 participants with the resources and treatment they need and deserve. We are excited to be able to offer this resource to our community and open our front door as a first step in recovery from drug and alcohol addiction. If an obstacle for transportation exists, our officers will provide transport for the individual accepted for placement to a treatment facility to ensure the pathway to treatment is not impeded.

Jump Out Party

SUMMARY


2019 was a busy, productive year for the detective division. In addition to carrying a full caseload of criminal investigations into offenses including burglary, theft, sex crimes, murder, narcotics related homicides and robbery, the division continued its efforts to combat the illicit trade of narcotics in the City of Port Jervis, and while steaming full force ahead into the obstacles of the new Bail Reform, the division took a Federal approach to both narcotics and violent crimes.


NARCOTICS ENFORCEMENT

Enforcement of the state narcotics laws has been a top priority of the division and in 2019, detectives continued their efforts with an enhanced approach to targeting those who sell and distribute illicit drugs. Detectives noticed an upswing in overdose related deaths in regard to Fentanyl laced Heroin and were able to identify a main source of the Fentanyl / Heroin to a subject residing outside of the city and states borders in Montague, New Jersey named Robert Ciervo. Detectives began a lengthy investigation where we were, with the help of the F.B.I. and the New York State Police, able to arrest Robert Ciervo, Robert Flood, Margaret Flood and Travis Hopper in a conspiracy to distribute Fentanyl and Heroin case that ultimately resulted in the deaths of two residents of the City of Port Jervis and Tri-State area. The defendants are being prosecuted by the Southern District of New York by the United States Attorney's Office.

One of the major tactics in the proactive approach is making controlled purchases of controlled substances using undercover police officers or confidential civilian informants. Detectives worked closely with the Orange County District Attorney's Office, the Orange County Sheriff's Office, the New York State Police, the Town of Deerpark Police Department, Eastern Pike Regional Police Department and the F.B.I.


Detectives also were able to affect several local City of Port Jervis search warrants targeting the sales of Heroin and Crack Cocaine in the City of Port Jervis. Those cases are being prosecuted by the Orange County District Attorney's Office.





SEARCH WARRANTS

Detectives obtained **25** court ordered search warrants from either the Port Jervis City Court or the Orange County Court. Warrants were obtained for narcotics investigations and for other cases such as child pornography, larceny, crime scenes, computers and other offenses. The chart below demonstrates the breakdown of warrants by type in 2019.



MAJOR CRIMES

A few selected cases are reviewed below:

August 3, 2018: **Justin White and Tranelle Drake:** White and Drake were subsequently arrested stemming from a robbery and kidnapping that took place at 230 Jersey Avenue, Port Jervis. White was additionally charged while in Orange County Jail on 2/26/2019 stemming from an investigation into a sexual relationship he had with a female minor. White subsequently plead guilty to charges in both cases and was sentenced to 16 years state prison time. Drake also plead guilty to the robbery and was sentenced to 13 years state prison time.

September 17, 2018: **Lionel Williams:** Williams was subsequently arrested by Port Jervis Detectives for an attempted forcible rape that took place on the D&H Canal Trail along West Main Street in Port Jervis. Detectives, along with the Orange County District Attorney's Office, worked long and diligently on the case leading up to the arrest and prosecution of Williams. Williams exercised his right in taking the case to trial; the case was heard in Orange County Superior Court where he was found guilty of all charges. Williams was later sentenced to 18-21 years in state prison.

December 17, 2018: **Eric Fruedenberg:** This was an investigation into Fruedenberg being in possession of child pornography. After investigating Freudenberg, two search warrants were conducted of Freudenberg's residence of 6 Owen Street, Port Jervis during the month of December. Evidence was collected and later turned over to the NYSP Computer Crimes Unit. This investigation led into 2019; evidence collected was subsequently analyzed resulting in a very large quantity of pornographic images of children. This was the largest collection of child pornography in this area. Due to the vast quantity of images located, the F.B.I. was contacted to be involved and prosecute the case. Freudenberg was held on other charges and remains in Orange County Jail at this time. On 3/10/2020, Freudenberg was subsequently charged while at Orange County Jail by the F.B.I. with several federal charges resulting from this investigation; Freudenberg's case is currently pending.

December 20, 2018: **Richard Fischer:** This was an investigation into Fischer having a sexual relationship with his 13-year-old niece as well as his 6-year-old son. The investigation led into January of 2019 where Fischer admitted to engaging the 13-year-old female in a sexual relationship while she slept as well as his 6-year-old son. On January 22, 2020 Fischer was arrested and charged with crimes related to his sexual abuse of the 13 and 6-year-old. Fischer subsequently plead guilty to the top charge and was sentenced to 7 years in state prison and added to the lifetime sex offender registry.

March 7, 2019: **Jose Cruz:** This was an investigation into the illicit sales of heroin within the City of Port Jervis. Detectives conducted a buy/bust operation on Ridge Avenue in Port Jervis. The target of the investigation, Jose Cruz, was residing at 23 East Broome Street, Port Jervis, Cruz had agreed to sell heroin to a Port Jervis City Confidential Informant in the 4th ward. Detectives took up surveillance in the area and observed Cruz exiting his residence and proceed onto Ridge Avenue. Detectives successfully took Cruz into custody and located a small quantity of heroin on his person. A search was later executed at his residence as well as a search of Cruz workspace located at Skydyne on River Road. After searching Cruz's workspace, Detectives recovered approximately 31.8 grams of raw heroin belonging to Cruz; he subsequently plead guilty on May 3, 2019 and was sentenced to 3 years in state prison sentence for the arrest.

May 31, 2019: **Ashley Parker:** Detectives investigated an overdose related death of a female victim, Lyn Mason, at her residence in the City of Port Jervis. Detectives were able to process the crime scene and develop a suspect in relation to the criminal sale of the narcotics that caused Mason's death. Parker was subsequently questioned and admitted to selling the heroin to Mason which caused her death. Parker was arrested and subsequently plead guilty to Criminal Negligent Homicide as a result of the sale; Parker was sentenced to 4 years in state prison.

September 4, 2019: **Kerry Sauer, James Kientopp, Jeremy Barrella, John Wells:** This was an investigation into Sauer attempting to engage a 13-year-old male into a sexual relationship using the Grindr application leading to a meeting between Sauer and the victim. A thorough investigation led to the recovery of the victim's cellular phone and evidence linking Sauer to a sexually explicit conversation with the 13 year-old-male. Sauer was arrested and arraigned on charges stemming from this incident. A continued investigation into the cellular phone retrieved, identified three other adult male subjects who engaged the 13-year-old male victim in a sexual relationship. An operation conducted by detectives portraying the victim by using the victim's cellular phone, led to the arrest and apprehension of James Kientopp, Jeremy Barella and John Wells. Kientopp plead guilty to the top charge and was sentenced to a 6-month jail term with 10 years felony probation; Kientopp must also register as a sex offender. Wells plead guilty to the top charge and is awaiting sentencing. Hearings are scheduled in the case against Barrella and Sauer.

September 15, 2019: **Home Invasion/Attempted Murder:** Patrol units were dispatched to 25 Seward Avenue, located in the 4th ward, for a report of shots fired. Upon arrival of patrols, it was learned that several masked subjects forcibly entered 25 Seward Avenue, an apartment belonging to Shameik Washington, and attempted to rob him. During the robbery, a struggle ensued leading to six shots being fired at the victim. The masked suspects then fled the apartment and entered a vehicle, fleeing the city; the victim was uninjured during the incident. Detectives worked the case with the assistance of the NYSP Forensic Investigation Unit. After

investigation, two suspects were positively identified with a possible identification of a third suspect; the suspect vehicle was also identified. The case is currently still active and being investigated by members of the Port Jervis Detective Unit as well as the F.B.I.

November 12, 2019: **Nicole Layman:** City of Port Jervis Police Officers and Detectives responded to Hornbeck Avenue in Port Jervis, for a report of a newborn infant that was discovered abandoned and deceased. A perimeter was set up by patrols and a neighborhood canvas was completed. Layman, the mother of the infant, was subsequently located that night; after several interviews, Layman was released pending results from the Orange County Medical Examiner's Office. The case continued into 2020 when Layman was arrested on 2/18/2020 for Murder 2nd; Layman was later indicted for Murder 2nd among other charges. The case is currently still pending hearings and trial.

TOWARDS 2020

The division is maintaining an aggressive approach towards narcotics enforcement for the year 2020. Working with the Orange County District Attorney's Office, detectives will also increase seizures of assets used in the commission of drug offenses, such as money and cars. Seizures are governed by strict laws and guidelines and are accomplished with the direct involvement of the District Attorney's office.

The division is also maintaining its approach of working with Federal Agencies, such as the F.B.I., A.T.F., and Homeland Security in an attempt to hold more serious offenders accountable for their illicit activities.

The division also seeks to continue working with the public, neighborhood watch groups and Port Pride, to ensure that tips and information are appropriately channeled and used in a timely manner.

With the incline of violent crime, as well as dangerous controlled substances, the division is also proactively targeting weapons possession. Removing guns and weapons from the street is vital to both the safety of the public and of the officers. Due to the potential threat of violence, the department has used the Orange County Sheriff's Office Special Operations Group when executing high risk narcotic and weapons warrants; this excellent working relationship will continue in 2020. The division has also continued to work with the Pike County Drug Task Force, New York State Police Investigators, Orange County Drug Task Force and the F.B.I. Street Crimes Task Force to go after individuals that may reside outside the City, but come into the City to sell drugs and/or commit other crimes.

In proactive initiatives, detectives set up and conduct compliance checks with the Orange County Probation Department and New York State Parole.

The goal of the division in 2020, in addition to closing criminal cases and assisting with the successful prosecution of those cases, is to maintain the momentum in the war against drugs in the City of Port Jervis and to make Port Jervis and unpopular place to set up shop to sell drugs.





July-December









2019 PORT JERVIS POLICE DEPARTMENT AWARDS

The Port Jervis Police Department held their annual awards review by the Department Awards Committee for the 2019 year of service. The Department Awards Committee, consisting of members representing all sworn ranks within the department including Patrol Officer, Detective, Sergeant, Lieutenant and Chief of Police, performs an annual review of enforcement activities, major incidents, investigations, arrests, responses to medical emergencies and public service.

Referrals of exceptional acts and service are made to the Awards Committee and each submission is carefully reviewed by the committee members to determine if an award of commendation is warranted and the level of award issued. The committee then refers their finding to the Chief of Police for presentation to the selected award recipients.

The Department's Traffic Safety Program is modeled after the New York State Association of Chiefs of Police Program. It is designed to recognize outstanding commitment to traffic safety with the goal of preventing and reducing traffic related fatalities, injuries, crashes involving property damage and increased pedestrian safety. The Traffic Safety Program operates on a year to year basis. The Patrol Lieutenant reviews the yearly reports and presents his findings to the Chief of Police. The types of traffic infractions analyzed are designed to target common accident causing behaviors and improve overall traffic safety. The Department recognizes six officers in the department for their outstanding commitment to traffic safety and driving while intoxicated enforcement efforts in an effort to make our streets safer for motorists and pedestrians.
